OPERATIONS

All active MAC C-124 squadrons, including the 50 TAS at Hickam Air Force Base were inactivated. To retain some capability for moving outsized loads within the theater, four of the squadron's C-124 aircraft were reassigned to Clark's 20th Operations Squadron. The first C-124 arrived at Clark Air Base on 12 February 1970

PACAF's last four C-124 assigned to the 20th Operations Squadron at Clark, departed for the continental United States during November. 1971

The 20th Operations Squadron, originally based at Clark Air Base, Philippines, converted from C-118s to C-9s in 1972.

In 1989, according to PACAF officials, three C-9s from the 20th Aeromedical Airlift Squadron moved from Clark Air Base to Yokota Air Base, Japan. A fourth was later added.

As part of Air Force reorganization in October 1992, Military Airlift Command — now known as Air Mobility Command — transferred airlift responsibilities in the Asia-Pacific theater to PACAF. The 20th Aeromedical Airlift Squadron was inactivated Oct. 1, 1993, and the 30th Airlift Squadron

was reassigned from Air Mobility Command to the 374th Airlift Wing under PACAF on the same date.
